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Foreword

The advent of *bomb disposal* ('BD') represented something rather different to the established, diverse and gallant role of Sappers since The Norman Conquest. At the time of writing, the ultimate sacrifices made by men of the bomb disposal sections, those glorious and hastily formed units of 1940, is still a living memory to the few; but unknown to the many. Those 'originals' knew little or nothing of 'BD' until they found themselves *in it*. They knew little of enemy bombs until they sank shafts and attempted to remove the lurking menace within. Many were not passed as fit for frontline combat roles . . . but were recognised as 'skilled at digging'. Those men, few of whom had volunteered for this unforeseen contribution to the war effort (but were valiantly assisted by a small band of Conscientious Objectors, who had) often paid a high price for the privilege of *learning on the job*. The ultimate sacrifice made by future generations of BD Sappers, from the ravaged battlefields, beaches and cities of WW2, to the numerous regional conflicts that followed, would be immediately recognisable to the stalwarts of the 'Blitz'. Such is the nature of bomb disposal.

In compiling the volumes of the Roll of Honour, Peter Markham's work has extended the list of bomb disposal's fallen from the dark days of 1940 and into the 21st century. This work is important for two key-reasons. Firstly, as events recede ever further into the past, establishing a single work of reference that seeks to locate all the names of the dead, and the nature of their contribution, is the right thing to do. Secondly, by developing a contextualised and BD-specific list, an inadvertent oversight is redressed: sacrifices, often made in shadows cast by the harsh light from surrounding battle, become illuminated. While BD's fallen may not have died whilst fighting as company groups or regiments, their achievements were no less glorious. Moreover, the challenges they faced, as observed by Churchill, were often significantly more "grim". This Roll of Honour represents a valuable addition to our collective history and is testament to the memory of our fallen.

This document is one of four, produced to pay tribute to those who have passed whilst serving in the Royal Engineers Bomb Disposal/Explosive Ordnance Disposal Units from 1940 to the Present Day.

The entries include those who died on active duty, those who passed away through accidents, natural causes. It also includes, sadly, those who took their own lives.

This project really is best described as a joint venture between the Royal Engineers Association (REA BD Branch) and the RE Bomb Disposal EOD History Group (History Group). The links to both of which can be found in the Sources References page.

It started in 2006 with an initiative started by the REA BD Branch. Over nine years, using various sources and assistance from others, the Roll was put together. It includes photos of graves and memorials as well as incident details from a range of other sources. This work was originally put into the REA BDB website.

Since then, through the History Group, the information has been greatly increased as more sources have been discovered and Casualty Cards/Service Cards located. This was no small task; and around 24,000 cards have been read to identify those serving from 1940 to 1949. Many other sources have been examined to find details from 1949 onward.

The primary aim of this research is to move the Roll of Honour from just a list of names, and develop a resource to benefit families, researchers and others with an interest in the BD history - and the people who made it.

These volumes are living documents which will grow over the years and be updated regularly.

Born 2 August 1922. Died through an accidental bomb explosion Guida, Greece.

Enlisted 15 January 1942.

Served with 18 Field Park Company, 17 March 1944: 1 Bomb Disposal Platoon from 5 June 1945.

Lance Sergeant G A Askey, Corporal C D Hoare, Sappers A Barnes, J J Hill, T Smith, Drivers B H Misselbrook, R Robertson also died in this incident - 3 injured and two trucks destroyed.



Died 3 July 1945, aged 22.

Born on 30 July 1916 in West Bromwich. Died as a result of a mine explosion at Cuckmere, Sussex, whilst removing mines from beaches laid as part of anti-invasion measures.

Next of Kin, informed 12 December 1944.

Enlisted 14 January 1940 at Smethwick.

Served with Construction Company, 4 January 1940; British Expeditionary Force. 19 March 1944; Bomb Disposal Companies and 11 Bomb Disposal Section.

Opinions of Chief Royal Engineer, 2 Bomb Disposal Group, Royal Engineers.

- a. No questions of a technical nature arose.
- b. L/Cpl Wake and Spr Adams were killed whilst engaged in minefield clearance by the explosion of a mine.
- c. They were not to blame and the accident was occasioned by the inadvertent low flying aircraft distracting their attention.

Lance Corporal B A Wake also died in this incident.

Cause of death: detonation of a delayed action fuze, in Birmingham.

Corporal A Haines, Sapper W W Davies, A Knight (Rabinowitz) , W H Thorne and W B Wisely, Driver W H Fergusson also died in this incident.

Awarded 1939 -1945 Star and War Medal 1939 - 1945.



Enlisted 15 March 1940. Next of Kin, Father, Mr Appleton, 65 Cephas Street, Mile End, London E1. Next of Kin Notified 4 October 1940.

Served at 1 Training Battalion, Shorncliffe; 6 Bomb Disposal Section, 6 Bomb Disposal Company.

Killed whilst excavating a UXB, when it exploded in Maidstone, Kent. Died on 3 October 1940.

ARCHER, William Arthur (1986614) Sapper, 2 Bomb Disposal Company, 61 Bomb Disposal Section, Royal Engineers.

Born in Manchester. Enlisted on 27 April 1939, aged 36. Next of Kin Widow Violet Evelyn Archer, 11 Maldon, Grove, Royal Oak Estate, Manchester.

Served with 2 Training Battalion, Royal Engineers, Newark; 110 E L Army Troops, 6 October 1939; Bomb Disposal Section, 5 Bomb Disposal Company, 10 September 1940; 2 Bomb Disposal Company, 18 September 1940.

On 10 November 1940 a 250 kg bomb was recovered with a badly damaged fuze, which could not be removed (it had passed through a cast iron drainage cover). The bomb was considered to be so damaged as being incapable of functioning. Therefore, it was loaded onto a lorry and taken to the Duke of York's Barracks, Chelsea, where the men then went for their evening meal. 2 Lieutenant L G W Carter saw the bomb on the lorry and decided for safety to take it to the Bomb Cemetery, at Regents Park. Captain Hunt was invited to go with him; however, he declined the offer. Driver Brinton was also excused from this duty as he had a date that evening. Nevertheless, 2 Lieutenant Carter decided to drive the lorry himself.

As they drove up Marylebone Road - near to Madam Tussauds - the bomb exploded killing them all.

2 Lieutenant L G W Carter, Corporals L J Sharp, L G W Carter, Sappers J W Cookson, W D Cubitt and W Pass also died in this incident.

Enlisted 13 June 1940. Next of Kin Wife Blanche Armitage, 6 Ruskin Grove, Sheepbridge, Huddersfield.

Served in 2 H T D, Royal Engineers, York, 81/82 Bomb Disposal Section, 14 September 1940.

Died at 142 Hawthorne Road, Bootle, Liverpool. Commanding Officers Opinion. All necessary precautions taken. In the absence of any direct evidence as to cause it is impossible to arrive at a definitive decision. Accidental bomb explosion, possibly due to vibration of stakes being driven into the ground in close proximity, starting the fuze.

Sapper E Baker, H Molyneux also died in this incident.

Served with 5 Training Battalion, Royal Engineers, 16 May 1940; 16 Bomb Disposal Section 28, September 1940.

UXB exploded while being excavated, Carriage Wharf, Dorchester Street, Shoreditch, London.

Lance Corporal G Webster, Sappers J Fletcher, F Robinson also died in this incident.

Awarded the 1939 - 1945 Star and the 1939 - 1945 Defence Medal.



Died 3 January 1941, aged 22.

Moving a UXB fitted with two anti-disturbance fuzes, when it detonated. 121 Connor Road, Dagenham, London.

Second Lieutenant L W E Foster, Sappers L H R Hitchcock, R J Lewis and Driver E W Websdale also died in this incident. Seven others injured including Sapper B Woolhouse all taken to hospital, B Woolhouse and three others returned to Bomb Disposal Duties.

Minefield explosion whilst clearing mines laid as anti-invasion measures at Frinton minefield, Leigh on Sea, Essex. Inquiry finding: on duty not to blame.

Sappers J Corcoran and S Moore also died in this incident.

Awarded the 1939 -1945 Star and the 1939 - 1945 War Medal.

Served with 4 Field Squadron, 13 June 1940; 67 Bomb Disposal Section, 22 November 1940; 1 Bomb Disposal Section; Proceeding to Port of Embarkation, 14 November 1942; Embarked for North Africa, 12 November 1942,

Died through an accidental bomb explosion Guida, Greece. Balkans and Greece Campaign 1944/45.

Lance Sergeant G A Askey, Corporal C D Hoare, Sappers A Barnes, J J Hill, T Smith, Drivers B H Misselbrook, R Robertson also died in this incident, three injured and two trucks destroyed.

Awarded the 1939 -45 Star and the 1939 -1945 Defence Medal.

ATHERTON, Albert Alexander, (2012202) Sapper, 2 Bomb Disposal Company, 18 Bomb Disposal Section, Royal Engineers.

Born in 1915 in Liverpool. Enlisted 25 April 1940. Injured 6 October 1940. Next of Kin Mother Mrs E C Atherton, 31 South Street, off Pier Road, Liverpool 8. Next of Kin, informed by Lewisham Hospital, 19 October 1940; and by 2 Bomb Disposal Company on 22 October 1940.

Served with 5 Stevedore Battalion and 2 Bomb Disposal Company.

Inquest findings. Admitted to Lewisham Hospital, injury to spine, lorry skidded and bomb rolled against back. Dangerously ill in Hospital 6 October 1940.

Extract from AFB 117: Fracture of vertebrae, ribs and severe injuries to kidney. Accident occurred whilst in performance of duty. Accident due to his negligence, by sitting on the side of vehicle, with his back protruding through the canvas cover No one else was to blame.

From the Unit Lieutenant: Accident was not due to a bomb falling on Spr Atherton as is stated in form EMS 105. A passing tramcar struck his back, which was bulging through the cover of the lorry.

Court of Inquiry at London: Opinion of CO. On duty in absence of instructions as to how personnel were to travel in WD vehicles. Sapper Atherton cannot be regarded as to blame.

Born 27 January 1912 at Kings Lynn. Enlisted 14 June 1940. Next of Kin Wife, Mrs E M Atkins of Kings Lynn, Norfolk, informed on the 30 March 1945.

Served with 2 Training Battalion, 18 July 1940; 6 Bomb Disposal Section, 9 September 1940; 5 Bomb Disposal Company, 10 September 1940; 2 Bomb Disposal Company, 18 September 1940; 22 Bomb Disposal Company, 3 November 1944.

Died following a mine explosion, Bradmore, Nottinghamshire, whilst clearing mines laid as part of the anti-invasion measures.

Inquiry by Chief Royal Engineer 3 Bomb Disposal Group: On duty not to blame, death due to war operations.

Coroners Verdict; Death due to War Operations.

Sapper H Bowler also died at this incident

Born 17 June 1923 in Somerset. Enlisted 18 August, 1944. Next of Kin, Wife, Mrs T S Atkins, Stone Leach Farm, Wrightington, Wigan.

Died in Cheltenham Hospital after a motorcycle accident at Coombe Hill, Gloucester. Fracture to the base of his skull.

Served with the Training Battalion, Royal Engineers 14 January 1930; 7 Field Company 30 December 1930; 4 Fortress Company, 23 April 1932; 7 Field Company, 6 January 1933. Transfer to Army Reserve 9 June 1938; 7 Field Company, 15 August 1939; 21 Field Park Company, 3 September 1939; 1 Bomb Disposal Group, 10 November 1940; 18 Bomb Disposal Company, 11 January 1941; Headquarters, 2 Bomb Disposal Company, 1 Bomb Disposal Group, 21 February 1941; 18 Bomb Disposal Company (date unknown); 24 Bomb Disposal Company, 3 May 1941; 21 Bomb Disposal Company, 6 September 1940; 25 Bomb Disposal Company, 3 May 1941.

Fuzes were being removed from a 250kg bomb by the Earl of Suffolk (Charles Howard GC, an experimental officer for the Ministry of Scientific Research), when it exploded, Bomb Cemetery, Erith Marshes, Kent.

Sappers R S Dutson, B J Gillett, J W Hardy, Driver D Sharratt, the Earl of Suffolk, his Secretary Ms E Morden and his Driver Mr F Hands also died in this incident. Unconfirmed that others were injured.



Died 12 May, 1941, aged 28.

Born 2 August 1923, South West, London. Enlisted 7 January 1943. Next of Kin, Mother, Mrs E Auger, 4 Battersea Bridge Buildings, Battersea, S W 11.

Served in 5 Training Battalion Royal Engineers, 17 February 1943; 875 M & W P Company, 24 April 1943; 20 Bomb Disposal Company, 8 October 1943.

Mine Sweeping operations of beach mines laid as anti-invasion measures at Dungeness, near Lydd, Kent.

Chief Royal Engineer, 2 Bomb Disposal Group found no one was to blame.

Harry Cox was born in London and grew up in Hythe, Kent. He was over 6 feet 3 inches and called Little Harry to differentiate from his father, Big Harry, who was 6 feet 4 inches. He was apprenticed to a cabinet maker and became qualified. A keen cyclist, he won medals with the Cinque Ports cycling club before the war. He played the piano and clarinet with a small dance band. When the war started, he volunteered, hoping his skills would lead him to being a "Chippie" in the Royal Navy. In fact he was drafted into the Royal Engineers. After fighting in France, he came back from Dunkirk wearing only the bottom half of his pyjamas, having been evacuated from a field hospital. After leave he returned to his unit and was sent to a Bomb Disposal Unit. He worked in London all through the Blitz, and eventually was offered a Commission, which he declined. It would mean moving from the close-knit unit, who all knew and trusted each other. Their lives literally depended on each other. He married Edna shortly before being posted to Egypt. Edna was barely five feet, and wore a tall, orange-blossom tiara to try and "bridge the gap" in their heights. There were no children. In the desert, the unit was set to clearing mines. They hated this; bombs they knew; mines were more unpredictable. They were right. Their lorry went over a mine and was blown up. Harry wrote regularly and receiving no letters created anxiety at home, but people said, in the manner of the time, "No news is good news". It wasn't – in the Autumn the dreaded orange envelope arrived. In due course it was noticed that Sapper Cox's name was not on any war memorial. With the help of the Royal British Legion, this oversight was corrected and he is now recorded on the Hythe memorial on the Royal Military Canal bank.

On 21 February 1940, were working on a bomb in Castle Street, Swansea. When partially uncovered it was found to be fitted with a Type 50 anti-disturbance fuze. A bomb could be made safe by either dealing with the fuze or removing the explosive filling. This was done by steam sterilisation. The filling plate was removed out a hole cut into the side, then a jet of steam was inserted this would melt the cast explosive inside. Here follows the report from Major J B James who was Officer in Charge of the Company. Sterilisation commenced at 1330, by Headquarters sterilisation staff, Staff Sergeant Munford in charge. At 1625 the steam was turned off, Munford informed Lieutenant W D Rees OC of 103 BD Section that the explosive filling had been steamed out to below fuze chambers level. He recommended bringing the bomb out of the hole and finishing the steaming in the back street. Lt Rees realised a second or lower fuze had still to be exposed. Which could be a 19 Clockwork delay fuze. S/Sgt Munford informed him that they had been checking using a stethoscope and there was no sound of ticking. Therefore it was decided to lift the bomb clear of the hole. A clamp was attached to the filling end of the bomb, and a rope attached between it and a lorry. Instructions were given for everybody to take cover. When this was done the order to pull was given. Sergeant Finney countered this order as he saw the rope was slipping, he secured the rope on the lorry. Maj James once again gave the order to commence pulling. He was watching the bomb when it exploded. He felt the blast and got under the lorry as debris was falling. When he came out, he saw a body on the ground on the far side of the lorry, when he checked he found five others. He believes they came out of cover when the rope slipped and due to where he was standing, he did not see them. Staff Sergeant Munford was due to go to London to receive his Commission, he was only on site as he had relieved a comrade. Sapper Harry Vallance recalls, that his section had meant to be on this task, however they had been busy the other Section had volunteered. Sapper Vallance and the other Section were working on another bomb when the explosion happened, they rushed to the scene but could do nothing more than identify their comrades.

Staff Sergeant T A Munford, Lance Sergeant T R Henderson, Corporal JG Salisbury, J A Holder, Lance Corporal J F Johnstone, Driver R W G Simpson also died at this incident. Lieutenant Rees and Sergeant Finney both suffered shock and punctured ear drums and were hospitalised for a considerable period.



CUNNINGHAM, George Killian O'Bryne, (201238) Lieutenant, 20 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born in 1912 in the United States of America, living in Buckinghamshire.

Died when a UXB exploded whilst being rendered safe. Back Door Field, Billingham Farm, Sussex.

On September 20 1940, a German daylight raid against London was attacked by fighter command, Near Rye a Heinkel 111 was badly damaged by three RAF Fighters and two others crash landed. Just before crashing one of the planes unloaded its bombs on Back Door Field, Billingham Farm, in the village of Udimore, near Rye. In 1940 three of the bombs were made safe and removed. Three other bombs fell upon muddy ground. As they were dug for, they sank lower into the ground. Due to the high demand for Bomb Disposal Units and the low threat presented by these bombs, they were abandoned, till a later date. By 1944 the Ministry of Agriculture wanted to return the field back to agricultural use. Two bombs were successfully defused. Lieutenant G C Cunningham and Sergeant G Mack were instructed to deal with this final bomb. They were stationed about 12 miles away near Catsfield, in a large house called Burntwood. Sergeant Mack and a squad of Sappers arrived, dug out a shaft and uncovered the bomb. Lieutenant Cunningham was on site; it was his job to defuse the bomb. It would seem that Lieutenant Cunningham was down the shaft and Sergeant Mack stood at the top looking down the shaft, when the explosion occurred both men died.

Lieutenant Cunningham was of Irish descent, born in Ohio, USA. Sergeant Mack was born in Ayr, Scotland. Both men were unmarried. On 6 May 1940, 60 years to the day of the incident, about 40 people and the press led by both Army and Air Force Standard Bearers, went to the dual headstone set in St Lawrence Churchyard. A ceremony in tribute to these brave men was conducted. Poppy Wreaths were laid and the Last Post sounded; it rang across a quiet countryside accompanied by the musical sound of a blackbird. The above account was taken from a small booklet in the church. This had been researched by John Hanniford, who served as a Captain with Bomb Disposal during the War,

Sergeant G L Mack also died in this incident.





Written in a memorandum book, the letter said - " If I should die, it was because I was ashamed of my weak and puny efforts beside those of my gallant comrades in the army, who under most difficult and trying circumstances, performed miracles "I tried too hard, worried and then completely lost confidence in myself, but not

the cause of freedom, for which I volunteered to fight. Because of my lack of confidence, I found it impossible to face comrades, although I tried desperately hard to win through. I cannot believe even now that this should have happened to me, but I seem driven on by some inexorable fate to a doom which involves everyone I love "Further paragraphs referred to the love of his wife and children. A verdict of suicide while the balance of his mind was disturbed was returned.

He had been found behind a straw stack on a farm near Chatham with a bullet wound near his heart and a six chambered service revolver with one chamber empty nearby. He was wearing a battle dress.






