Foreword

Each name notes a family forever changed, and a life spent in the service of freedom.

This document is the second of four to pay tribute to those who have passed whilst serving in the Royal Engineers Bomb Disposal/Explosive Ordnance Disposal Units from 1940 to the Present Day.

The entries will include those who died on active duty, those who passed away through accidents, natural causes and sadly took their own lives.

This really is best described as a joint venture, between the Royal Engineers Association (REA BDB) and the RE Bomb Disposal EOD History Group (History Group), the links to both which can be found in the Sources References page.

It started in 2006 with a project by the REA BD Branch and over nine years through various sources and people's assistance, the Roll was put together, photos of graves/memorials taken and what details that could be referenced, as to incidents put together. This was put onto the REA BD Branch website.

Since then through the History Group the information has been greatly increased, as more sources have become available and Casualty Cards/Service Cards have been located. Not a small task around 24,000 cards have been read to identify those serving from 1940 to 1949. Many other sources have been looked at to find details after 1949.

Its primary aim is to move the Roll of Honour from just a list of names, to a resource where families/researchers and others with an interest, can use.

These are live documents which will grow with more information through the years.

FARNWORTH, Robert Alexander, (154256) Lieutenant, Bomb Disposal, Royal Engineers.

Court of Inquiry 11 October 1941. Died due to the explosion of an enemy parachute mine in Palestine. Court of Inquiry Verdict. Killed by the explosion of a booby trap in the tail of the bomb. Death resulted from the over zealousness of Lieutenant Farnworth in doing unnecessary work on the tail and this resulted in the bomb exploding.

Lance Sergeant Sutton and Sapper D Berry also died at this incident.

Born 19 September 1911 in Blackford. Enlisted 28 October 1940. Enlisted 28 October 1940. Next of Kin Father, Thomas Lewis Bayne Farquharson, Guldees, Moray Street, Blackford. NOK notified 26 August 1941.

Served with 22 Line of Communications Training Company, Royal Engineers.

Died when an anti-personnel bomb (SD2-Butterfly bomb) detonated, Saxstead, Suffolk.

Awarded the 1939 - 1945 Star and the 1939 - 1945 War Medal.



Died 24 August 1941, age 29.
Son of Thomas and Johanna Farquharson of Blackford.

Buried at Blackford Cemetery, Perth, Scotland.

FEARON, Albert E, (4270436) Sapper, 85 Bomb Disposal Section, Royal Engineers.

Enlisted 14 May 1935. Next of Kin Father, Christopher Fearon, 53 Oban Road, Byker, Newcastle-on-Tyne. NOK notified 21 August 1940.

Served with 563 Field Park Company 14 February 1940; 220 Field Company, 12 May 1940; 85 Bomb Disposal Section, 27 June 1940.

Died when a delayed action bomb detonated, near Alverston, Nantwich, Crewe.

Sappers H Thompson, M Lambert G Lucas, J Percival died in the incident, Sergeant E Greengrass died 2 days later.



Died 17 August 1940, age 19.

Buried at Byker and Heaton Cemetery, Northumberland. Section G Grave 251.

Memorial has been placed in Alverson Hall, Nantwich, Crewe.

FERGUSON, George, (323012) Lance Corporal, 15 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born 6 December at Muirkirk. Enlisted 27 March 1938 in Muirkirk. 1918. Next of Kin Mother, E Ferguson, 41 Garrow Hill, Muirkirk. NOK notified 23 June 1943.

Served with 173 Quarrying Company, 27 June 1940; 2 (FB) Depot Battalion Royal Engineers, 25 July 1941; 24 Bomb Disposal Company, 19 August 1941; 15 Bomb Disposal Company, 30 June 1942; 156 Bomb Disposal Section, 22 November 1942; embarked for North Africa on the 22 November 1942.

Died whilst dumping unserviceable enemy ammunition at sea. A detonation occurred for no apparent reason.

Sergeant G H Sim, Lance Corporal J Sinclair, R V Whitefield, Sappers S Gentry, J Keen, T W Littler also died in this incident, in Tunisia. Les Stokes survived; he had gone into the cabin to get a cap.

Born in Cardiff. Enlisted 24 April 1939. Next of Kin Father, Albert Edward Fergusson, 180 Penarth Road, Cardiff. NOK notified 28 August 1940.

Served with 53 (W) Division, 24 April 1939; 561 Field Company, 30 December 1939; 68/69 Bomb Disposal Section, 6 July 1940.

Admitted to Erdington Hospital Birmingham, seriously ill, multiple wounds to legs caused by the detonation of a time delayed bomb following a raid.

Corporal A Haines, Sappers W W Davies, A Knight (Rabinowitz), W H Thorne, W B Wisley, Driver M T Andrews, also died in this incident.



Died 27 August 1940, age?
Son of Mr and Mrs A E Fergusson of Cardiff.

FIBBENS, Frank, (2001694) Sapper, 23 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born in Sussex. Enlisted 28 March 1940. Next of Kin Father, Charles, Monsville, Birdham, Chichester, Sussex.

Served with 1 Stevedore Centre Folkestone; 20 Bomb Disposal Company, 11 January 1941; 23 Bomb Disposal Company, 28 June 1943.

Died clearing mines laid as part of the anti-invasion measures around the UK. Beach mine explosion at Dover, accidental death. According to the Chief Royal Engineer 2 Bomb Disposal Group, evidence shows that Spr Fibbon was on duty when fatally injured by an explosion of a mine. Negligence is not proven.

Corporal C E Easton also died in this incident.

Awarded the 1939 - 1945 Star and the 1939 - 1945 War Medal.

Son of Walter and Gertrude Fibbon of Birdham, Sussex.

Born 21 February 1913 in Devizes, Wiltshire. Enlisted 30 July 1936 in Salisbury, aged 23. Next of Kin Father Jesse Fidler, The Green, Urchfont, Devizes, Wilts. NOK was notified at 1845 11 March 1942. Reported Missing on the 15 February 1940, 3 August 1943 camp not yet stated, Letter sent to the NOK. Camp Malai 1 in Thailand NOK notified 19 June 1944.

Served with A Company Training Battalion, Royal Engineers, 30 July 1936; A Company Training Battalion, 12 April 1937; 30 Fortress Company, 16 October 1937; 1 Malaya Bomb Disposal Company, 30 July 1941.

Died whilst a Prisoner of War of the Japanese, of Avitaminosis/cholera in Thailand.

Awarded the 1939 - 1945 Star and the 1939 - 1945 War Medal.



Died 22 July 1943, age 30.

Served with 2 Training Battalion, Royal Engineers, 13 August 1940; 853 Quarrying (Bomb Disposal) Company, 12 November 1940; 7 Bomb Disposal Company, 15 January 1941.

Died on Bomb Disposal Duties in Plymouth, Devon.

Lieutenant's L J Ball, D Ross, Sapper's D A Palmer, E Thompson, Driver A W Stevens, R Sullivan also died in this incident.



Died 27 March 1941, age 22.

Husband of Elizabeth Laura Fishwick of Ryhope, County Durham.

Category A bomb, delayed action detonated 15 ½ hours after being dropped.
Woodbridge Lane, Moseley, Birmingham.

Sapper O E Braysher and J E Brown also died in this incident.

FLETCHER, Alfred Edward, (2209043) Sergeant, 6 Bomb Disposal Company, attached to 8 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born 6 March 1906 at Weston-Super-Mare. Enlisted 1 June 1933. Next of Kin Wife, Mrs A Fletcher, 16 Argyle Avenue, Weston-Super-Mare, Somerset. NOK was notified on 26 March 1942.

Served with 43 Division, 1 June 1933; 45 Division, 15 December 1939; 261 Field Park Company, 15 December 1939; 47 Bomb Disposal Section, 19 June 1940; 6 Bomb Disposal Company.

Inquest verdict, Misadventure. Court of Inquiry, Commanding Officers Opinion, met his death through misadventure. Although his orders were somewhat indefinite, he was on duty at the time of the accident, in Somerset.



Died 24 March 1942, age 36.

Son of William and Edith Fletcher of Weston-Super-Mare. Husband of Ada Fletcher of Western-Super-Mare.

Born 23 June 1915 in Salford. Enlisted 4 January 1940 aged 24. Next of Kin Widow, Sarah Fetcher, 32 South Street, Highfields, near Doncaster. NOK was informed on the 6 January 1941.

Served with 5 Training Battalion, Royal Engineer, 28 March 1940; Royal Engineer Construction Centre Clacton, 4 January 1940; 662 General Construction Company, 5 November 1940; 5 Bomb Disposal Company; 16 Bomb Disposal Section, 28 September 1940

Died when a bomb detonated, which was being excavated at Carriage Wharf, Dorchester Street, Shoreditch, London.

Lance Corporal Robinson, Sapper J H Ash, F Robinson also died in this incident.

Awarded the 1939 - 1945 Star and the 1939 -1945 War Medal.



Died 3 January 1941, age 36.

Next of Kin Mother, Mrs Ford, 2 Collwood Terrace, Jemond, Newcastle-on-Tyne.
NOK was notified on 1 October 1940.

Served with 235 Field Park Company, 8 May 1939; 508 Field Park Company, 22 January 1940; 5 Training Battalion, 28 February 1940; 2 Depot Battalion, 5 July 1940.

Died when a bomb detonated while being excavated, it was in the rockery behind the surgeon's house at Joyce Green Hospital, Kent.

Born 16 June 1942 in Newcastle. Enlisted 19 September 1942. Next of Kin Mother, 23 George Street, Newcastle-Upon-Tyne.

Served with 7 Training Battalion, Royal Engineers, 28 October 1942; 659 A W Company, 15 March 1943; 3 Home Depot Battalion, 8 April 1943; 10 Bomb Disposal Company, 16 May 1943.

Died whilst clearing mines laid as part of the anti-invasion measures around the UK. While detecting and lifting mines there was an explosion, causing fatal injuries. Inquest verdict, death caused by multiple injuries while performing hazardous duties in North Wales.



Died 17 November 1943, age 21.

Son of William and Margaret Jane Forster of Newcastle-Upon-Tyne.

FOSHER, Charles Adam, (1883496) Lance Corporal, 8 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born 14 December 1900 at Maidstone. Enlisted 4 January 1940, aged 26. Next of Kin Widow, Esher Ellen Foshier, The Bungalow, Old Stone, Stafford. NOK informed 27 November 1940.

Served with 4 Training Battalion, Royal Engineers, Colchester, 15 January 1940; Headquarters, 8 Bomb Disposal Company, 10 September 1940.

Died working with mines laid as part of the anti-invasion measures around the UK. Coroners' verdict: death by misadventure. Court of Inquiry, cause and place of death explosion of a mine (accident). According to the Commanding Officer there appears to be no evidence to show what caused the accident as the only survivor saw nothing, Fitzgammon Embankment Sully Beach Wales.

Corporal S G Hanford and Lewis died in this incident.

Awarded the 1939 - 1945 Star and the 1939 - 1945 War Medal.



Died 12 November 1940, age 26.

Son of Albert Abraham and Caroline (Eiffert) Foshier. Husband of Esher E (Southey) Foshier. Children Frederick, Rose and Elizabeth. Sisters Alice and Edith.

FOSTER, Leslie William Eade, (100603) Second Lieutenant, 5 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born in 1902 living in Surrey.

Moving a UXB fitted with two anti-disturbance fuzes, when it detonated. 121 Connor Road, Dagenham, London.

Second Lieutenant W F J Ash, Sappers L H R Hitchcock, R J Lewis and Driver E W Websdale, also died in this incident. Seven others injured including Sapper B Woolhouse all taken to hospital, B Woolhouse and three others returned to Bomb Disposal Duties.



Died 7 October 1940, age 38.

Buried at Saint Nicholas Churchyard, Thames Ditton, Surrey. Old Part Grave L S 6.
Son of William Frederick and Bertha Steller Foster. Husband of Katheleen Foster of Thames Ditton.

Born on the 14 September 1919, living in Sheffield. Enlisted on the 5 March 1940. Next of Kin Mother, 42 Thornborough Road, Arborthourne Estate, Sheffield 2. NOK was notified on 14 April 1941.

Served with 566 Field Company, 25 September 1940; admitted Southport emergency Hospital, 25 September 1940; 9 Bomb Disposal Company, 28 December 1940.

Died when a 250kg fitted with a type 15 and 50 fuze fitted detonated, in Coventry.

Lieutenant Lewis Winn and M F H Lloyd, Driver G Jones also died in this incident.

Served with 1 Depot Battalion, Chatham, Z Holding Company 22 May 1940.

A German delayed action bomb exploded at Grand Avenue, Hove.

Lance Sergeant E Moss also died at this incident

Born 22 November 1911 in Yorkshire. Enlisted 23 October 1940. Next of Kin Wife, Mrs H A Freer, 12 Ranlagh Drive, Edgware, Middlesex. NOK was notified on 15 July 1943.

Served with Training Company, Royal Engineers; 15 Bomb Disposal Company, 23 October 1940; embarked for North Africa with 158 Bomb Disposal Section, 22 November 1942.

Died as a result of dysentery in North Africa.



Died 9 July 1944, age 31.

Buried at Enfidaville War Cemetery, Tunisia. Grave E 11 E 16.

GALL, Roderick, (14213557) Sapper, 20 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born 30 June 1906 at Cruden Bay. Enlisted 14 May 1942. Next of Kin Mother, Mrs Gall, North Haven, Cruden Bay, Aberdeenshire. NOK was notified on 4 August 1943.

Served with 69 C W C, 31 July 1942; 20 Bomb Disposal Company, 5 August 1943.

Died in the Royal Naval Hospital, Chatham, Kent, multiple injuries due to a fall from a window. Coroners' verdict, fell from a window in the middle of the night, no evidence as to what happened. Commanding Officers Opinion, he had been in the unit since 1 July and it is reasonable to assume that he would be conversant with the position of the doors, windows and night urinal in his barrack block.



Injured on the 31 July 1943. Died 3 August 1943, age 37.

Born 1 March 1919. Enlisted 5 January 1940 aged 20. Next of Kin Wife, Mrs E E Galloway, 14a Ainslie Gardens, Perth. NOK was informed on 2 October 1943.

Served with Royal Engineers Construction Centre Clacton, 5 January 1940; 657 General Construction Company; 12 Bomb Disposal Company, 23 December 1940.

Died clearing mines laid as part of the anti-invasion measures in the UK. No evidence to show how the explosion occurred. Verdict accidental death. Angmering on Sea, East Preston, West Sussex.

Lieutenant W E K Kenway, Lance Corporal A Raynor, Sappers J Buchanan, H R Jones also died in this incident. Sapper Gresser was injured and died the next day.

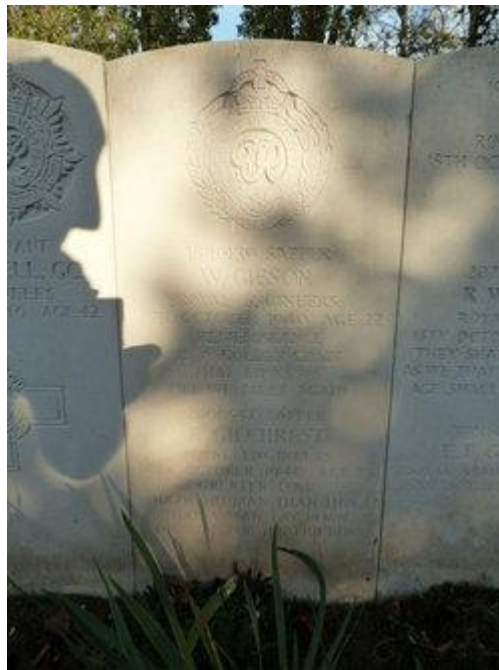

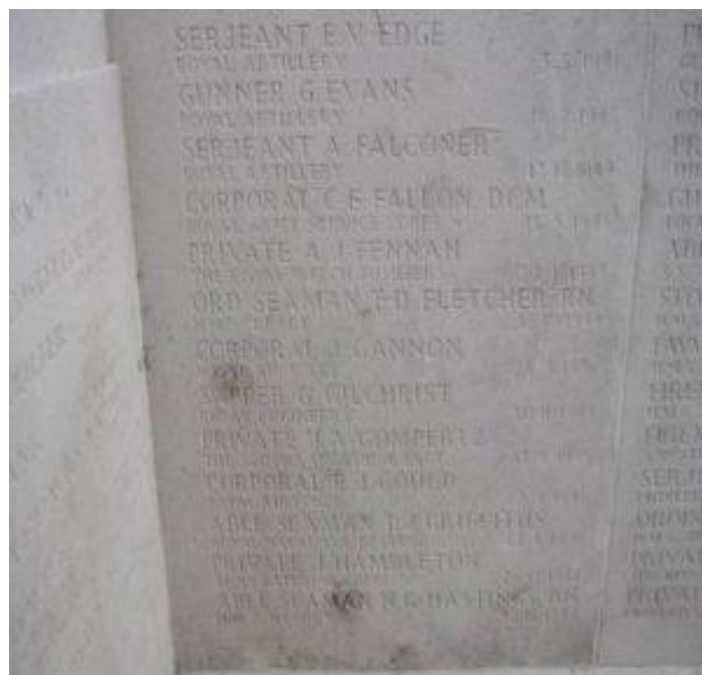

Soon after 3 pm an enemy aircraft was engaged by the BMAR Company factory defence guns, manned by work staff and Home Guard. The plane was hit and damaged and driven off, but not before it had released four bombs on the town. One of the bombs landed on sidings between the Station and Springfield Road Bridge, but did not detonate. BDO was sent for and the next day a bomb disposal team exposed a 1000 lb bomb. The Officer Lt Gilkes reported that the bomb was fitted with two fuzes, each equipped with a booby trap device. Its time fuze could be heard ticking. If not stopped it was likely to detonate the bomb within the next ten days. At 3.15pm the area was cleared so that Gilkes could attempt to make the bomb safe. Three minutes later a tremendous explosion rocked the station area, blasting two policemen who were approaching to check on progress. The courageous Lt died instantly. Inspector Curry, one of the police men wrote in his post incident report, I have nothing but admiration for the dauntless courage of this officer. I am convinced he knew he was taking a risk which was almost certain to cause his death. He took the risk cheerfully, however, one of his last remarks to me were, well when you get back, I shall most probably be on my way to St Peter. The filling plate was removed out a hole cut into the side, then a jet of steam was inserted this would melt the cast explosive inside. Here follows the report from Major J B James who was Officer in Charge of the Company. Sterilisation commenced at 1330, by Headquarters sterilisation staff, Staff Sergeant Munford in charge. At 1625 the steam was turned off, Munford informed Lieutenant W D Rees OC of 103 BD Section that the explosive filling had been steamed out to below fuze chambers level. He recommended bringing the bomb out of the hole and finishing the steaming in the back street. Lt Rees realised a second or lower fuze had still to be exposed. Which could be a 19 Clockwork delay fuze. S/Sgt Munford informed him that they had been checking using a stethoscope and there was no sound of ticking. Therefore it was decided to lift the bomb clear of the hole. A clamp was attached to the filling end of the bomb, and a rope attached between it and a lorry. Instructions were given for everybody to take cover. When this was done the order to pull was given. Sergeant Finney countered this order as he saw the rope was slipping, he secured the rope on the lorry. Maj James once again gave the order to commence pulling. He was watching the bomb when it exploded. He felt the blast and got under the lorry as debris was falling. When he came out, he saw a body on the ground on the far side of the lorry, when he checked he found five others. He believes they came out of cover when the rope slipped and due to where he was standing, he did not see them. Staff Sergeant Munford was due to go to London to receive his Commission, he was only on site as he had relieved a comrade. Sapper Harry Vallance recalls that his section had meant to be on this task, however they had been busy and the other Section had volunteered. Sapper Vallance and the other Section were working on another bomb when the explosion happened, they rushed to the scene but could do nothing more than identify their comrades.

Staff Sergeant T A Munford, Corporal JG Salisbury, J A Holder, Lance Corporal J F Johnstone, Sapper W Craig, Driver R W G Simpson also died in this incident. Lieutenant Rees and Sergeant Finney both suffered shock and punctured ear drums and were hospitalised for a considerable period.

Lt Wakeford accompanied by Sgt Hilder proceeded down the shaft to see if they could tackle it. Lt Wakeford threw his cap to Cpl Norman for safe keeping. Sgt Hilder ordered Cpl Norman to leave the area; he was about 15 yards away when the bomb detonated behind him. Lt Wakeford and Sgt Hilder both died.

Lieutenant R A Wakeford also died in this incident.

A bomb could be made safe by either dealing with the fuze or removing the explosive filling. This was done by steam sterilisation. The filling plate was removed out a hole cut into the side, then a jet of steam was inserted that would melt the cast explosive inside. Here follows the report from Major J B James who was Officer in Charge of the Company. Sterilisation commenced at 1330, by Headquarters sterilisation staff, Staff Sergeant Munford in charge. At 1625 the steam was turned off, Munford informed Lieutenant W D Rees OC of 103 BD Section that the explosive filling had been steamed out to below fuze chambers level. He recommended bringing the bomb out of the hole and finishing the steaming in the back street. Lt Rees realised a second or lower fuze had still to be exposed. Which could be a 19 Clockwork delay fuze. S/Sgt Munford informed him that they had been checking using a stethoscope and there was no sound of ticking. Therefore it was decided to lift the bomb clear of the hole. A clamp was attached to the filling end of the bomb, and a rope attached between it and a lorry. Instructions were given for everybody to take cover. When this was done the order to pull was given. Sergeant Finney countered this order as he saw the rope was slipping, he secured the rope on the lorry. Maj James once again gave the order to commence pulling. He was watching the bomb when it exploded. He felt the blast and got under the lorry as debris was falling. When he came out, he saw a body on the ground on the far side of the lorry, when he checked he found five others. He believes they came out of cover when the rope slipped and due to where he was standing, he did not see them. Staff Sergeant Munford was due to go to London to receive his Commission, he was only on site as he had relieved a comrade. Sapper Harry Vallance recalls, that his section had meant to be on this task, however they had been busy the other Section had volunteered. Sapper Vallance and the other Section were working on another bomb when the explosion happened, they rushed to the scene but could do nothing more than identify their comrades.

Staff Sergeant T A Munford, Lance Sergeant T R Hederson, Corporal JG Salisbury, Lance Corporal J F Johnstone, Sapper W Craig, Driver R W G Simpson also died in this incident. Lieutenant Rees and Sergeant Finney both suffered shock and punctured ear drums and were hospitalised for a considerable period.

The alternative method of sterilizing the bomb was not at the time available and at great personal risk, and with full knowledge of the grave danger, he personally entered the crater to carry out the process. Unfortunately, the bomb exploded and Captain Blaney lost his life.

The filling plate was removed out a hole cut into the side, then a jet of steam was inserted that would melt the cast explosive inside. Here follows the report from Major J B James who was Officer in Charge of the Company. Sterilisation commenced at 1330, by Headquarters sterilisation staff, Staff Sergeant Munford in charge. At 1625 the steam was turned off, Munford informed Lieutenant W D Rees OC of 103 BD Section that the explosive filling had been steamed out to below fuze chambers level. He recommended bringing the bomb out of the hole and finishing the steaming in the back street. Lt Rees realised a second or lower fuze had still to be exposed. Which could be a 19 Clockwork delay fuze. S/Sgt Munford informed him that they had been checking using a stethoscope and there was no sound of ticking. Therefore it was decided to lift the bomb clear of the hole. A clamp was attached to the filling end of the bomb, and a rope attached between it and a lorry. Instructions were given for everybody to take cover. When this was done the order to pull was given. Sergeant Finney countered this order as he saw the rope was slipping, he secured the rope on the lorry. Maj James once again gave the order to commence pulling. He was watching the bomb when it exploded. He felt the blast and got under the lorry as debris was falling. When he came out, he saw a body on the ground on the far side of the lorry, when he checked he found five others. He believes they came out of cover when the rope slipped and due to where he was standing, he did not see them. Staff Sergeant Munford was due to go to London to receive his Commission, he was only on site as he had relieved a comrade. Sapper Harry Vallance recalls, that his section had meant to be on this task, however they had been busy the other Section had volunteered. Sapper Vallance and the other Section were working on another bomb when the explosion happened, they rushed to the scene but could do nothing more than identify their comrades.

Staff Sergeant T A Munford, Lance Sergeant T R Henderson, Corporal JG Salisbury, J A Holder, Sapper W Craig, Driver R W G Simpson also died in this incident. Lieutenant Rees and Sergeant Finney both suffered shock and punctured ear drums and were hospitalised for a considerable period.

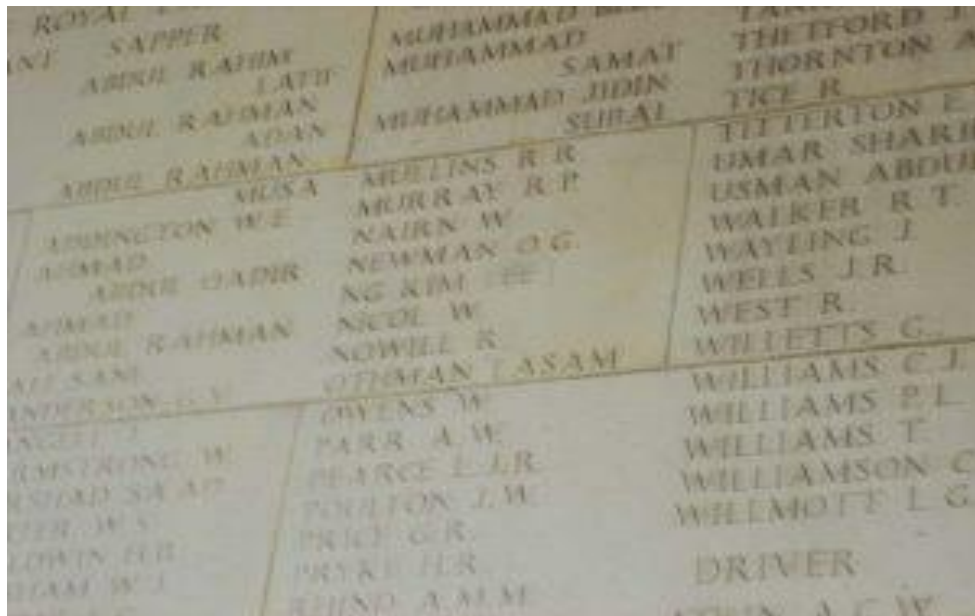

Knowles, Wilfred, (4536616) Sapper, 14 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born 18 August 1904 in Burnley. Enlisted 19 May 1939 in Armley aged 34. Next of Kin Wife, Mrs L E Knowles, 84 Throssel Road, Middleton, Leeds.

Served with transferred to the Corps from the West Yorks, 4 December 1939; 170 Tunnelling Company, 5 December 1939; embarked for Gibraltar, 4 March 1941; embarked from Gibraltar, 4 March 1943; disembarked UK, 10 February 1943; 3 Holding Depot Battalion, 11 February 1943; 159 Artisan Works Company, 8 May 1943; 4 Bomb Disposal Group, 1 November 1943; 23 Bomb Disposal Company, 1 November 1943; 6 Bomb Disposal Company, 15 November 1943; 14 Bomb Disposal Company, 11 August 1944.

The Section were working in a sandy area, in a minefield South of Redcar. It had always been a saving grace that in areas where mines were likely to move, they were wired together, so having located one it was possible to locate others by following the connecting wires. Sapper Knowles and Lance Sergeant Marston were doing this even though it meant tunnelling for the mine. This they had done and were going to disarm the mine when the tunnel collapsed and set it off. Lieutenant Dobbie had just arrived and was walking towards them when it detonated. He was decapitated by a piece of the mine casing.

Lieutenant A G Dobbie, R Stewart, Lance Sergeant T H Marston also died in this incident.



Died 17 November 1944, age

Son of Thomas and Beatrice Knowles: Husband of Lillian Evelyn Knowles of Middleton, Leeds.

Buried at Hunslett New Cemetery, Leeds. Section 3A Cons Grave 53.

Annex A

Non-Bomb Disposal

HORTON, Frederick George, (T/211357) Driver, Royal Army Service Corps, attached to 2 Bomb Disposal Company, Royal Engineers.

Born on the 2 January 1910 in Scunthorpe, North Lincolnshire.

On 10 December 1940 at Bushy Park Teddington or Osterley Park, Middlesex, a section was working on a UXB when it detonated. It was a cold day and the section had adopted the standard practice of lighting a fire and brewing a large Dixie of tea. Sapper Jimmy Hulme had gone to see to the tea when the bomb detonated. He was knocked over by the blast and a piece of shrapnel hit him in the back. He spent some time in hospital and then returned to his unit. After this incident he acquired a slight stammer but was otherwise okay.

Lieutenant K G Hope, Lance Corporal C B Lebbon, W Hatton, , Sapper J R Darsley, Driver A K Hartland, F G Horton Royal Army Service Corps also died in this incident.



Died 10 December 1940, age 30.

Son of Norman and Alice Horton, of Broughton Astley, Leicestershire.

Buried at Sutton Elms Baptist Chapel yard. Broughton Astley, Leicestershire.
